A Message from our Minister



I am getting ready to cheer on Team GB as they compete in Rio at the 2016 Olympic Games, or the "Games of the XXXI Olympiad". St Paul was familiar with the Greek games. He even wrote about the Christian life being like a race, and ourselves as the competitors, looking for the prizes, the crown in heaven. Writing of the need for self-discipline he says "Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize" (1 Corinthians 9.24, NIV). Christian people are not in competition with each other, but are competing against the things that drag us away from God.

We don't all run in the same way. We are each unique. I have been inspired by an article in the last month's edition of Methodist Buzz. You will excuse me for quoting so much:

Earlier this year, Maghull Methodist Church Ladies' Fellowship decided to join the fun of Sports Relief and do a sponsored stagger from the church to local shopping square, about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile.

"With dodgy tickers, hip replacements and a myriad of other age related inconveniences, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile can actually feel like a marathon," said Glynis James. "However, we were undaunted and enticed by the promise of free tea and coffee generously supplied by our local Costa Coffee! I have a theory that no one thought we would actually do it so they wouldn't have to pay up! How wrong they were!"



By last week the ladies had already raised an amazing sum of £1,000.

I am not suggesting that a sponsored stagger is for every Ladies Fellowship but these Merseyside Christians express something of hope that is essential in Church life, and indeed inspirational in all human society. Toys

Items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls or stuffed toys (with CE label), toy trucks, harmonica, yo-yo, skipping rope, ball, small puzzles etc.

School Supplies

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

Hygiene Items

Toothbrush and toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Other Items

Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set, wind up torch, wrapped sweets (best-before-date must be at least March of the following year).

DO NOT INCLUDE

## *Open the Book: Bringing the Bible to life for every child in every primary school.*

Children love stories – especially Bible stories when they're interactive, engaging and fun.

Open the Book began in 1999 and since then thousands of school children have discovered Bible stories, during assembly and collective worship.



Today, so many children could miss out on the great classic stories from the Bible – Noah, Daniel and the life of Jesus could be closed chapters if youngsters don't get an opportunity to engage with the Bible.

That's why Open the Book is so important. It's a three-year rolling programme of themed and dramatised storytelling at no charge to primary schools. Teams of volunteers throughout the country use drama, mime, props, costume – and even the children and staff themselves – to present the Bible stories in lively and informative ways.

Amphill Baptist Church have teams in several schools including a lower school in Flitwick. However, the other schools would like a team. We are trying to arrange a Flitwick team willing to commit to one assembly a week initially, and arrange training, working with the other churches. I have seen the amazing effect of Open the Book in schools, and the confidence that it's given to volunteers also. Please let me know if you are interested.

## *From the Methodist Conference*

The 2016 Annual Conference of the Methodist Church passed a resolution containing the following text:

The United Kingdom, as a result of the referendum on 23 June 2016, has voted to leave the European Union. In this time of very significant change and uncertainty there is a need for leadership which seeks the common good and encourages people to work together, to respect one another and to uphold the dignity of all.

The Methodist Conference believes that the British Isles are enriched by diversity and celebrates the contribution made by those who have come from other parts of the world.

The Christian tradition calls for respect, tolerance, love of neighbour and hospitality to the stranger. All bear the responsibility of speaking and acting for healing, reconciliation, and mutual respect.

The Methodist Conference abhors and deeply regrets those actions and words which incite hatred and lead to the victimisation of groups within society and notes with concern that such actions and words have been normalised in recent public discourse. Believing that racism is a denial of the gospel and that to stay silent when others are abused is to collude with those who seek to promote hatred and division, the Methodist Conference calls:

- on the Methodist people to challenge racism and discrimination;
- for a political debate which neither demonises any nor leaves the vulnerable (the foreigner, the immigrant and refugee) in danger of victimisation;
- on political leaders to work together for the good of the whole community putting the needs of the nation before party politics;
- on all those in positions of power and authority to hear the voices of those who have been marginalised and alienated and to respond to them in ways which offer real hope for the future.

News from Paraguay

11th June 2016

I know all about temperature drops. Here winter seems to have arrived early. It has been cold every night this week with, I think, a bit of frost, but I didn't get up early enough to check if that was the case! Ramona came over earlier wearing two coats.

I get lots of little birds and every morning when I get up they are waiting in the trees around the bird table for their breakfast and are down as soon as I take a couple of steps away. In an hour the table is clean. They do come back during the day to check if any more food has magically appeared!

16th June 2016

It has been slightly warmer over the weekend. However all the grass has been killed off and turned yellow and I expect will stay that way for a couple of months before everything turns green again. So all looking rather wintry outside. There has not been any rain for a while and that turned up today, but it was steady rain rather than a storm - so quite like English rain really.

Ramona came over to visit and she wants to cook for me at the weekend, so I will have to go to town via her house on Saturday and find out what ingredients are needed.

Oh - and your igloo. I did eventually see the photo and it looked a very clever idea - milk cartons I believe.

21st June 2016

Ramona cooked for me on Sunday. The chicken turned out to be roasted for a couple of hours with loads of herbs and vegetables and very tasty and a change from the usual fare of either things either barbecued or in tomato sauce! I am sure she enjoyed having the electric cooker to play with.

This week so far I had Monday doing the washing and cleaning around the house. Then today I went to Caacupe with Colin to sort

out a new laptop for Rene and I found them a very nice one and at a very good price. I will go there for a new one if ever this one decides it doesn't want to work any more. Then tomorrow the plan is to go down to Paraguari where with a bit of luck I will find some books waiting for me at the post office.

27th June 2016

I have seen all the new things on Adrian's Facebook page to mark his birthday.

I think it is not unlikely that Ramona will be waiting to cook again. There is no electric cooker over at her house. There is a gas oven, when there is gas in the bottle, and other than that it is firewood.

Over the weekend I collected a new pile of books. I had been chatting to an older couple (I think they are American) on Facebook who were looking to get rid of their books. I told them that it was big books rather than simple story books I would like and so when I met them on Saturday as they travelled to their country home - which is in the same part of the country as I am - they had a couple of bags full of big thick hardback books for me which contained, amongst other things, the works of Franz Kafka and John Steinbeck so should keep me well supplied with reading material for some time.....

6th July 2016

I had been enjoying warm winter sunshine until a storm turned up all flashing and banging last night and although the sun has come back this afternoon it is a bit cooler.

It was very good being able to meet up with those people to get a pile of new books. Handy since they have a country house out this way so pass near there on the way there, so meeting up was not too far out of the way for me or them. I was just finishing reading my book on Krakatoa when I got the books and am now reading one of them, a novel called The Source, which is a history of the land that is called Israel from the Stone Age up to the mid-50s when the book was written. Not a subject I would normally choose to read - but then you don't learn anything by always reading the same stuff!

12th July 2016

It was quite windy today, during the morning anyway, but with it also being nice and warm the washing was done put out and dried before lunch time! Winter never hangs around too many days in a row, but I think there is a bit more coming for the weekend.

Have you collected up some apps on that phone you bought when I was over last year? I have a few on mine and the latest is Google Earth, so I was able to find your house on my phone but it is still the same old picture with the bins outside. I thought someone would have been along to collect them by now..... Whilst you don't get new photos of your house the one of my house is only a couple of months old, so very up to date.

Here the schools have just started their two week winter holiday - although with warm sunshine you could hardly call it winter..... Hope you have a warm summer soon.....

17th July 2016

So your summer has still not arrived. Maybe by August it will have turned up. Here winter is having another couple of days. There was a cold wind blowing yesterday and today it is bright and sunny but rather cool. It should be better in a day or two.

It is always quiet this time of the year with it being the middle of winter. On the nice days as it has not been too hot I have been spending most of the time getting the garden tidied up, clearing away all the long grass to find all the trees. That is now nearly done and should stay done for a little while.

20th July 2016

I have seen that summer has arrived with you. I wonder how long that will last. We have had some chilly nights and actually quite a lot of winter this year.

With it being cooler it has been an ideal time for working out doors. This week I set the goal of clearing all the long grass from behind my big trees and down to the fruit trees and also from around
