A Message from our Minister

How big is our God? Bigger than the difficulties we face as church in the 21st century? Bigger than the troubles we encounter daily? Can we trust him?

I watched a Sky at Night special recently. It was unusual in that it was set in the Vatican and in one of their Astronomical Observatories. The Sky at Night presenters interviewed Brother Guy Consolmagno SJ, the director of the Vatican Observatory. They asked why the Vatican did science – he said "Why does anyone?" explaining that people want to see and understand the amazing place we live in – "Man does not live on bread alone" he quoted "so, we can ask bigger questions than 'What's for lunch?'." He concluded "Astronomy reminds me why I do everything else."

Ps 19.1 says "How clearly the sky reveals God's glory! How plainly it shows what he has done!" (Good News Bible). Yet the psalm writers didn't have science and didn't have a clue about how unimaginably vast the sky really is. Science shows God is a lot bigger that anything we imagine.

How big is our God? With the help of science, and each other, may God help us to realise that he is really much bigger than the difficulties we face as church and very much bigger than the troubles we encounter. Let's trust him.



stations based on 'I am' sayings of Jesus from John's Gospel.


You are welcome to use the ideas for prayer at the prayer stations or you can just come and be in God's presence. It would be good to see you there.



## George Matheson

George Matheson was born on 27th March 1842, into a wealthy Christian family in Glasgow. He was the eldest of eight children. During his childhood his eyesight was poor. However, he did well at school and went to Glasgow University to study Classics, Logic and Philosophy. Around this time his sight became worse and he learned that he had a condition that would result in him becoming blind.

While at university he met a girl and they fell in love but they never married because the girl said she didn't want to be married to a blind man.

George graduated at the age of nineteen with a first class honours degree and after studying theology became the pastor of a Presbyterian church in Innellan, Argyllshire. He was there for eighteen years and as well as preaching he wrote books. Queen Victoria came to know of him and he was invited to preach at Balmoral. Queen Victoria requested that his sermon, on the book of Job, be published.

George Matheson is perhaps best known for his hymn 'O love that wilt not let me go' and in his journal he recorded how it came to be written:

"My hymn was composed in the manse of Innellan on the evening of the 6th of June, 1882, when I was 40 years of age. I was alone in the manse at that time. It was the night of my sister's marriage, and the rest of the family were staying overnight in Glasgow. Something happened to me, which was known only to myself, and which caused me the most severe mental suffering. The hymn was the fruit of that suffering. It was the quickest bit of work I ever did in my life. I had the impression of having it dictated to me by some inward voice rather than of working it out myself. I am quite sure that the whole work was completed in five minutes, and equally sure that it never received at my hands any retouching or correction.

I have no natural gift of rhythm. All the other verses I have ever written are manufactured articles; this came like a dayspring from on high".

George also wrote other hymns including 'Make me a captive, Lord, and then I shall be free'.

In 1886 George moved to Edinburgh and was the minister of St. Bernard's Church for thirteen years, continuing to preach and to write. He died from a stroke on 28th August 1906 and is buried in Glasgow.

Here are the first and third verses of George Matheson's most famous hymn:

O love that wilt not let me go, I rest my weary soul in Thee; I give Thee back the life I owe, That in Thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.

O joy that seekest me through pain, I cannot close my heart to Thee; I trace the rainbow through the rain, And feel the promise is not vain, That morn shall tearless be.



## <u> News from Paraguay</u>

#### 14th May 2017

I have decided that for my visit I am going to be over from early December until mid January, which will be six weeks, and I look forward to having a proper Christmas. I will get the tickets sorted out this week so that I can give you exact details and then you can let everyone know that I am coming to visit.

I am sure they will all miss me, especially the little ones. I will miss Evangelina's birthday but with that being on the 16th December it would be far too close to Christmas if I stayed over here for that and then travelled. I am sure I can give her a little party before my holiday.

Your weather might be a bit mixed, but I am sure it is better than it was over here yesterday. During the afternoon for a couple of hours it blew a gale, shaking all the trees around whilst torrential rain came down turning the garden into a lake! If I had been the one planting bedding plants they would have all been flattened and washed away!

#### 20th May 2017

The weather here also has not been great this week. One day of heavy rain and then a couple of days with low cloud and steady light rain - so it has been nice to see the sun this morning and as it is a better day today I will go into town for an afternoon out.

There are plenty of things I would like to do whilst I am over with you, but the main thing is to have a proper traditional Christmas and see all the decorations and the like. A little snow would be nice to look at - as long as it does not hang around too much.

I will bring what I consider my winter clothes and hopefully they will be warm enough as I am quite selective about what I wear and won't wear just any old thing!!

I did notice that once again Luton had not managed to get through a playoff match and also see that if Arsenal want to be in the Champions League next year they need others to lose!

#### 24th May 2017

First of all the flights are all booked. So for your records the flight I arrive on is Latam 8084 from Sao Paulo which gets into Heathrow at 1.15 pm on the 6th December.

I thought I might be told there would be a problem getting from the airport to Flitwick. It will be a bit of a pain after travelling half way round the world! However, at least when I arrive I will have a light suitcase to drag around unlike when I return when it will be more inconvenient with no doubt a heavy suitcase. I expect I will have to spend a couple of hours on a tube train across London and then catch a train to Flitwick as I did when I found my own way from the airport once before. The Heathrow Express train is no good as that goes to Paddington, and I would still have to get across London. As for the bus when I looked up before I needed to book an actual bus in advance which as I have no idea how long it will take to get through the airport and customs did seem a bit silly, but that may have changed as it was a few years ago. I will investigate.

I will certainly pack all my warmest clothes (which shouldn't take too long!) and I am sure the shops would have something wearable in them for me to buy when I am with you.

The weather here has again been wet for a couple of days although it does look like brightening up now. However today it is so humid that damp patches on the tiles just won't dry and so the floor will more than likely stay damp until tomorrow.

There was a break in the rain yesterday so I was able to get down to Emilica's for a little birthday lunch for Jazmin's 12th birthday - that was better than cooking lunch!

#### 27th May 2017

I enjoyed talking to the Ladies Breakfast last time I was over and remember that the Men could not fit me into their schedule and asked if I would go and see them next time I was over. So - yes - I would

happily speak at the Men's Supper Club but would rather answer questions than doing a speech! The January dates sound ideal - let me know which date they would prefer. I see it is a Supper Club, which is a much more sensible time of day - and does that mean I will get fed??

Must tell you this tale - which always amuses me. When I was in the supermarket the other day I paid with my credit card. For my BIG payment - nearly £20 - the girl on the till asked if I wanted to pay it all in one payment. In other words did I want to pay for my shopping in instalments. Could you imagine rolling up to the till in Tesco or any of the other large supermarkets and offering to pay in instalments?

#### 29th May 2017

No sunshine at the moment - just very thick cloud, it is not so much as being misty it is more that the clouds are at ground level (well I am up in the hills) so everything is very damp, just like walking around in a cloud. I was due to go to lunch in Piribebuy with Colin today but was not at all surprised to get a text message at breakfast time saying he thought the weather was too bad to be going out. However I really do need to go to town so that is where I am going after the computer as it is not really that bad out there and I have just a bike not a car.

Also it now looks like I might have solved the problem of my long grass as one of the chaps from down the track came round asking if he could graze his cows on my garden. Of course I said that yes he could as long as they are tied up so they don't get to the plants!

I have not had cows grazing over here for a while. Last year the cows opposite disappeared one by one and since before Christmas there have been none over there. Occasionally it has been mentioned that a new one will be acquired but none have appeared. So it is very handy that someone else has come along looking for grass for his cows to eat.

#### 6th June 2017

Yes indeed I am still living in the cloud - in fact it has been really thick cloud stuck here for ages and it has not stopped raining for a week and a half so not very nice at all. Here up in the hills the water runs away but I did see a news report yesterday that there is quite a bit of flooding in the south where everything is lower and flatter.

It has been a while since there were any cows opposite. I understand it became much too hard work looking after them after Rodrigo and David moved away as there was no one to help with them every day. There are though still a few chickens and a pig over there.

With all this miserable weather there is not a lot more to tell at the moment. I stopped off to visit Evangelina for a couple of hours last time I went to town. I played with all her toys with her. It's quite easy for her to keep her toys together as what they really are is just a little pile of broken bits, but they keep her happy inventing things to do with them

#### 12th June 2017

As for it being winter that is not really acceptable. There have been a few rather cold days although it was not quite cold enough for frost. There were a couple of very cold nights made all the colder by everything here not being built for the cold. It was nice to stick my leg out of bed this morning and to find things a little warmer! So I was out in the garden all morning being busy making the most of the sunshine. Hopefully it will stay nice all week.

We do have fun when I go down the road to entertain Evangelina. Everyone can see who gets all her attention when I am down there. When I go to Paraguari later this week I am looking for a coat for her as the poor little thing hasn't got one and she is not very keen on being cold. Not really a good idea to bring back many toys for her, and she never has many, and all the really nice things that are for sale around here are quite rubbish. However I learnt long ago not to get anything too nice as that only ends up getting put away where it can't get dirty.

I didn't get up to much this weekend, as I was waiting for it to get a little warmer, so everything has been put back to this week and will now get caught up with!
