

A Message from our Minister

A true story.

Some Hollywood films use a secondary title "based on a true story" or "inspired by real life events". If it's a true story then it has a great appeal to many. Storytelling can change attitudes, change lives, move people to noble acts.

Throughout this March, many Christian believers will read the story of Jesus, particularly those last weeks up until his crucifixion, burial and resurrection. The story is presented in four different ways within ancient pieces of writing known to us as the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

It's more helpful than one might think that those four stories don't fully match each other. For in studying the differences, scholars have determined much about the different communities from which these documents emerged. However, all four are undoubtedly based on the same true story, a story that was told and retold from the very earliest days of belief in Jesus Christ, the Son of God. This story changed attitudes, changed lives, moved people to noble acts.

Such was the power of this story, that within 20 years it was causing much trouble for the international government of the day. They referred to the story as "rumours" and to the believers' way of life as "evil". The Roman historian Tacitus wrote:

To kill the rumours, Nero charged and tortured ... the group popularly known as 'Christians'. The founder of this sect, Christ, had been put to death by the governor of Judea, Pontius Pilate, when Tiberius was Emperor. *TACITUS, Annals 15.44* (quote from Dowley, T. (ed) (1990) *The history of Christianity*, Lion: Oxford 2nd ed.)

If you are able to get to the Bedford Passion Play on Saturday 26th March 2016, then maybe you'll get a taste of what it was like for those early believers who heard this powerful story for the first time, and feel it change attitudes, even change your life! It's a new script, the organisers say, but based on a true story.

As you approach and experience Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter 2016, may the story of Jesus truly touch your hearts and bring the discipleship, joy, love and healing that those early believers knew.

# Women's World Day of Prayer

## *Friday 4th March*

10.30 am at Ampthill Baptist Church  
7.30 pm at Flitwick Parish Church  
All (including men) will be welcome.



The service this year has been prepared by the women of Cuba.  
Theme: "Receive children. Receive me."

Women's World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical, prayer movement that invites women, from a different part of the world each year, to prepare a worship service through which their hopes and fears for their country may be brought before the whole world in prayer.

On Friday 4th March an estimated 3 million people in over 170 countries and islands will gather to observe the day of prayer, using an order of service written by Christian women in Cuba and translated into over 60 languages and 1000 dialects. In the British Isles alone over 6000 services will be held. The day begins as the sun rises over the island of Samoa and continues until it sets off the coast of American Samoa, some 35 hours later.

The theme 'Receive Children, Receive Me' reflects St Mark's Gospel, chapter 10 verses 13-16, which is the focus of the service and a reminder that everyone is a child of God and equally worthy of our love and respect.

The Republic of Cuba is the largest Caribbean island, located at the entrance of the Gulf of Mexico and called 'the Key to the Gulf'. Politically at odds with the USA, Cuba has suffered greatly due to the economic embargo imposed upon it in 1960 but has found strength within itself to move on and overcome many of its problems.

Easter Offering

You will receive an envelope for your Easter Offering for the World Mission Fund the week before Easter. Please return it with your gift on Easter Sunday or as soon as possible afterwards.

The tradition of the Easter Offering dates back to 1883 when women in Manchester collected £32 from 'Christmas pennies' at family gatherings on Christmas Day at lunch for Missionary work overseas. In March 1884, the London Districts distributed Easter envelopes and collecting bags asking for a penny a head and just over £100 was collected.

From this success, the idea grew and by 1900 the amount totalled £1,655. In 1903 Easter offerings were extended to all country chapels. 'Let us bear in mind,' they wrote, 'the importance of the "Littles"'.

Through gifts great and small, the Easter Offering has become a significant feature of the World Church. Throughout the country, effort focuses on the annual envelope collection for the Fund for World Mission through the Easter Offering and the associated service of dedication.

This reflects the long history of commitment to overseas work by the women of Methodism, and the recognition that local specific relationships with overseas projects and World Church in Britain partnerships are given broader meaning by a national focus. The theme and service are different every year.

Each year, the Methodist Church prepares an Easter Offering Dedication service. The Circuit Dedication Service this year will be held on Thursday 25th May at 2.30 pm at Priory Methodist Church, Bedford. Everyone is welcome to attend this service.

### *News from Paraguay*

18th January 2016

The rain has stopped for the moment, in fact it has been hot and sunny for a week. There has been much more rain than normal, the most for more than 30 years I hear. The waters have mostly gone down now, but of course there are a lot of repairs to be done. I have read that there are hundreds of pot holes a day being filled in, where springs had burst through, and the road is now dry, but not very flat. I guess all the tracks are the same so it might be a little while before my track gets repaired.

It is good to have a roof on the kitchen again. I have taken various photos which you will see, eventually, on my next disc. As the roof sheets were put back up after being blown round the garden they are not quite as flat as they used to be, so I need a good down pour to show where the leaks are so I can put tape on them to seal them up.

Evangelina does still have her oil drum prison. It is the size that oil drums normally are and has been cut down short enough for her to hold onto the rim. It would have been used for something else previously.

I went to visit Colin and Renata's at the weekend and they suggested that we might go in their river - which I said was a good idea - and spent the afternoon there.

22nd January 2016

Here the storms are keeping away and it has been hot and sunny all week - very much like summer should be. I have carried on being

busy with the kitchen. I bought some netting and put it up over the roof beams that now stick out over the patio to give a bit of shade there. Also there was a short sharp shower a few days ago so I was able to see where the roof leaked and yesterday was up on the roof taping over those leaks. Will wait for the next rain to see if that has done the trick. It was bound to leak a bit as the roof sheets were not totally flat after being blown around the garden. All that is left now is to reconnect the electricity and put on a fresh coat of paint. Also this week I had the grass cleared away from my driveway so it is like a road all the way down to the track.

#### 27th January 2016

It had been very hot this last week. But then there was heavy rain all day yesterday which tested out the kitchen roof - just one drip, and this is onto the floor and not above anything, so I will get up there some time and tape it over.

It does now mean the wood stove is back usable again. It was before if the wood had a couple of days to dry out, but now with the chimney back up all the smoke goes away. The next job is painting. I am thinking of doing one side of the house at a time. It would have been started by now, but of course needing to rebuild the kitchen rescheduled everything.

It is the same with my book - that was not done for a month whilst I was working on the kitchen - but has now restarted.

My track had now dried out, although this morning when I went out there were a few puddles on it. It is not very flat with all the water washing bits away and streams running across cutting out ditches. It may be a little while before it gets repaired as there must be hundreds of tracks needing repairs. Actually when I was in Piribebuy this morning I had to do quite a detour as a bridge just off the main road had been washed away and still not replaced. I think in Asuncion the water has gone down, but there is still a lot of cleaning up to be done and there are many other places along the rivers in the same condition. I did notice when I picked up a paper in town that

the corner that used to have the weather forecast now has predictions of river levels, so they must still be higher than normal.

#### 6th February 2016

Good to see when my new disc of photographs turned up it worked fine. Glad you liked them. Yes I did take some photographs of Evangelina all dressed up for her Christening and birthday, and I am sure very soon she won't be able to be stuck out of the way in her oil drum as she will soon be able to climb out of it!

As always, I was quite close to the front at the concert although I did zoom things in. The photos of Caacupe are from the Annual Festival taken as I passed that way on the way home.

They keep forecasting rain but so far it hasn't turned out that way and is actually sunny outside at the moment. There was some rain earlier this week. Wednesday was San Blas Day, which is the national saint, and that day from first thing until mid afternoon there was very heavy rain. So to go down to Alicia's for their pig roast I had to splash down the garden path and then wade across the track.

#### 11th February 2016

It must be nice that all your storms now have names so that you can greet them like old friends! Here it has carried on being hot. Now it is a very sticky sort of hot. February often gets like that waiting for the rains. Most days clouds build and it looks like it is about to start raining, then they just go away. Of course that just adds to the humidity.

It looks like it may be a little while before our track is repaired as I heard yesterday that the big road mending tractor has broken down and apparently the spare parts needed are not available anywhere in the country. I expect every other town that has a tractor is rather too busy to send it to Piribebuy.

I had a day out in Asuncion yesterday. My main reason for going was to get a ticket for my next concert. I had a little helper tagging along with me as Ramona had been promised a trip to the shops

during the summer holiday and is rather running out of holiday. Fortunately with classes so close what she was after was a new bag (one that didn't look like a backpack) and a big notebook - so we soon got these sorted out.

11th February 2016

I've just been reading the Bedford Times and Citizen - on line - and can tell you what all the fuss with the buses was about when you went to the hospital on Wednesday.

It seems that someone turned up at the police station with an old hand grenade they had dug up in their garden and they shut down all the surrounding roads while they waited for the bomb disposal people to turn up. Also it seems that there are going to be a few months of traffic problems ahead whilst Tavistock Street is closed for three months for repairs. How lucky I discover your local news before you do!!!

14th February 2016

Yes those mosquitoes - Zika has been added to the list of things that they can give you here, although that being said there seems to be a lot more fuss being made in the international press than the national press. It is brought by the same stripy legged ones that bring everything else. Mosquitoes do like a bit of standing water and there is never any of that round here.

Not at all cold here. It has carried on being very hot and humid. It is always like that in February until the autumn rain finally arrives. So no escape for anyone from the heat and humidity until they finally do!

I will keep you well informed with your local news and make sure you are all well informed what is happening in and around Flitwick!
